MUM: (looking in his mouth) Looks all right.



(sound effect: munching and slurping)


(The bowl is thrown out - empty.)

MONSTER: (under the bed) Gone! Tummy!

BEN: Come out!

(Monster squeezes out.)



BEN: Who are you? What are you? You're a ... that lives under my ...

MONSTER: Bed.

BEN: You ate my breakfast.

MUM: (offstage) You ready?

MONSTER: Today Mummy-thing's scary.

BEN: It's because Dad's gone.

MONSTER: You've got to go to school, (holding a jigsaw box) I've got to do my jigsaw.

BEN: Hey! That's my Jigsaw! And I'm not going to school today, because Vince stole my binoculars. Dad gave me them before he went away. I took them to school and Vince stole them.



MONSTER: Is Vince bigger than you?

BEN: Yes.

MONSTER: Bigger than me?

BEN: No.

MONSTER: You stay here then. I'll go and get the binoculars and eat Vince.

BEN: Miss Rowlands'll put you in the naughty corner.

MONSTER: Don't care.

(Monster starts to get dressed in Ben's clothes.)

MONSTER: Bad people should be eaten – that's what my dad says. (worried) Only my dad's poorly, and hungry.
And I've never been to school before. Is it ... scary?

BEN: Just call Miss Rowlands "Miss", put your hand up before you speak, and join in everyone else's games.

(Mum comes in and grabs Monster.)

MUM: School time. Come on.

(Mum drags Monster off.)

(Ben looks under the bed.)

BEN: Nothing there. Nothing at all.

(Suddenly a big arm shoots out from under the bed and grabs him.)

BEN: Aaaaargh! What do you want?

DAD MONSTER: (under the bed)I'm hungry!

(Ben is pulled under the bed.)



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SCENE 2: SCHOOL

(Monster is running. Miss Rowlands calls to him.)

MISS ROWLANDS: Ben! Get back here now!

MONSTER: Are you Vince?

MISS ROWLANDS: Do I look like Vince?

MONSTER: Er, no ... Miss? Sorry, Miss. I, er, had something in my eye,

Miss, and couldn't see properly.

MISS ROWLANDS:

But it wasn't stopping you running in the corridor, was it?

MONSTER: No, Miss.

MISS ROWLANDS: And what happens, Ben, to people who run in the corridor?

MONSTER: (thinking)They get eaten, Miss?

MISS ROWLANDS: Don't be cheeky. Now, it's dance time, so find a partner.

(All the class pair up. Monster grabs Anthony.)

MONSTER: Are you Vince?

ANTHONY: I'm Anthony, stupid.

MONSTER: Funny name, Anthony Stupid.

ANTHONY: You're weird today, Ben, you've got a funny look in your eye and you smell sort of dusty.

(Anthony takes Ben's glasses off Monster.)

ANTHONY: Wow! You're not Ben, you're -

(Monster snatches back the glasses. He blows at Anthony, who is whisked away and lands somewhere with a crash.)



CELINE: What's up with Anthony?

MONSTER: Dunno. You Vince?

CELINE: Course not, silly.

MONSTER: Where's Vince?

CELINE: He's gone to see the doctor. He'll be in later.

MISS ROWLANDS: Right everyone. Move to the music. Beautifully, like leaves on a tree in a spring breeze.

(Music plays. Monster moves like a tree, but then throws himself around like a mad thing. Celine tries to dance with him, but it's impossible.)




SCENE 3: UNDER THE BED

DAD MONSTER: What have you done with my son? You eaten him?

BEN: No, he's my friend.

DAD MONSTER: Fibber. Monsters don't have friends. You've eaten him for breakfast.

BEN: No! He's gone to school, to eat Vince.



BEN: I can do that.

DAD MONSTER: You're not leaving here, you won't come back.

BEN: I will, and I'll bring big fat sausages — Mum bought some the other day.

DAD MONSTER: (excited) I love big fat sausages ...

BEN: They'll be lovely and juicy and I'll get some nice cold milk and some cereal, and some marmalade and toast and butter and yoghurt and ... whatever else you'd like. We'll have a breakfast picnic.

DAD MONSTER: You'll bring all that food ... and promise not to run off?

BEN: Yes, if you promise not to eat me when I come back!



SCENE 4: SCHOOL

(Monster is fed up after a difficult morning. Miss Rowlands comes up to him.)

MISS ROWLANDS: Ben, about Dance ...

MONSTER: Sorry, Miss.

MISS ROWLANDS: And Maths.

MONSTER: Sorry. For sticking compasses in the ceiling.

MISS ROWLANDS: And Science.

MONSTER: Sorry. I didn't mean the explosion.

MISS ROWLANDS: I am not happy.



MONSTER: I'll take money from Ben's piggy bank to pay for the new door.

MISS ROWLANDS: Ben, are you all right today? I know your dad's gone away and I'm sure your mum's missing him. Are you OK?

MONSTER: I'll be better when Vince gets here, Miss.

MISS ROWLANDS: Of course. When things are difficult, friends are important aren't they? But don't worry, Vince'll be back soon. He'll be here for lunch.

(Miss Rowlands leaves.)

MONSTER: Lunch. Vince for lunch. Yes!



SCENE 5: UNDER THE BED

DAD MONSTER: Today me and Luke were going to do our Jigsaw.


BEN: You mean my |lqsaw!

DAD MONSTER: Ours too! When you go to school, we play with all your toys — your train track and toy cars and everything. Then put them back, exactly, so you don't know we're here.

BEN: Anyway the Jigsaw's rubbish, there's a piece missing. A 100-piece Jigsaw with one piece missing. Useless.

DAD MONSTER: Wait there.

(Dad Monster looks in the rubbish under the bed and finds one piece.)



BEN: It's the missing piece!

(Ben gets the other 99 pieces and they start to do the Jigsaw.)

BEN: You said "Luke". Is that his name? I didn't know monsters had names.

DAD MONSTER: Course we've got names.

BEN: What's your name?

DAD MONSTER: Not telling.

BEN: Go on, you know mine.

DAD MONSTER: Promise not to laugh?

BEN: Promise.

(Dad Monster whispers his name to Ben. Ben laughs and laughs and laughs.)



SCENE 6: SCHOOL

(Monster, Anthony and Celine are in the lunch queue. Vince comes in.)

VINCE: All right, everybody?

MONSTER: Grrrrr ...

VINCE: You all right, Ben? You look a bit funny.

MONSTER: You Vince?

CELINE: Good job you're here, Vince. Ben hasn't half been waiting for you. He's been in a right weird mood

all day.

(Monster takes off his glasses and there's thunder, smoke and lightning. He roars. He moves to get Vince. Panic. All the children are running.)



MONSTER: Vince!!!

(The children scream. Monster catches up with Vince.)

MONSTER: You! Binoculars! Now!

VINCE: I haven't got them.

MONSTER: Aarghhhhh! You made Ben unhappy. Nicked his binoculars. So Incey Wincey Vincey ... I'm going to pull off your legs and eat you.

(Monster grabs Vince. Miss Rowlands comes in.)





MISS ROWLANDS: Ben! Stop being a monster!
Naughty corner now!

(Monster quickly puts Ben's glasses back on and stands in the corner.)

MISS ROWLANDS: And stay there for the rest of the afternoon!

SCENE 7: UNDER THE BED

DAD MONSTER: I wonder what Luke's doing now.

BEN: He'll be with his friends - my friends - enjoying himself.

DAD MONSTER: I don't want him to be enjoying himself.

BEN: Well, maybe he's not enjoying himself.

DAD MONSTER: I don't want him to be not enjoying himself. When's he coming home?

BEN: Straight after school. The bell will go and Celine's mum'll bring me – I mean him – home.

DAD MONSTER: Good. Luke's coming home and we're all going to live happily ever after.



SCENE 8: SCHOOL


(sound effect: school bell)

(Monster stands with his bag. The children go home. Celine and Vince come in.)

MONSTER: Is it home time now?

CELINE: Maybe. I've told my mum that your mum phoned and that your mum said she's going to pick you up herself.

MONSTER: Good.

DAD MONSTER: Very very late. You've got to go and get him.

BEN: Can't. Mum wouldn't let me go on my own. You go.

DAD MONSTER: Can't. Can't go out. Can't go out! I live under the bed. It's too scary out there.

(Dad Monster hides under all the rubbish under the bed.)



SCENE 10: SCHOOL PLAYGROUND

(Monster stands at the gates. Vince comes in.)

MONSTER: Thought you'd gone home, left me.

VINCE: If you stay here, you'll die of cold. Or worse, your mum'll be dead mad for you not going straight home after school. Also ... I've got these ...

(Vince gives the binoculars back to Monster.)

VINCE: I shouldn't have kept them. Only they looked well smart ...

MONSTER: Celine said they were broken.



VINCE: She was upset ... Ben, there's something not right about you today. You've got welrd hands, your eyes are a different colour to yesterday, you smell sort of like under-the-bed. You're not Ben, are you?

(Monster shakes his head.)

VINCE: What have you done with him? Have you eaten him?

MONSTER: No. He's at home, his home, waiting for me to bring the binoculars back. Vince, I've got to get home, only I don't know the way. Help me. Please.


VINCE: I don't know the way either. What's your address?

(They sit down, worrled.)




SCENE 11: BEN'S BEDROOM

DAD MONSTER: Sorry, landings are the difficult bit. But I got my boy. Luke. Home at last.

(Dad Monster gives Monster a great big hug.)

DAD MONSTER: Had a nice day at school?

MONSTER: Yeah, great, cool, no problems, fantastic.

(Monster looks in the bag.)

MONSTER: Oh no.

VINCE: What's happened?

MONSTER: It wasn't great, cool, no problems, fantastic. It was terrible. I couldn't dance, couldn't do maths, I made Celine angry, I made Anthony angry, made Miss Rowlands angry, nearly ate Vince ... and now I've broken the binoculars.

BEN: (quietly) I was going to look through them and see ... where my dad was, that he was OK. Now I can't.



VINCE: Here, hold your hands like this.

(Vince makes a pair of binoculars with his hands.)

VINCE: Like this I can see anything I want. I can see all the way to China if I want, or the North Pole.

(Vince, Monster and Ben look out through pretend binoculars.)



VINCE: Look for your dad. Is he there?

(Ben sees his dad. He takes his hands down from his eyes. He smiles.)

BEN: Yeah. He's fine. Thank you.

(sound effect: a key in the front door)

MUM: (offstage) Ben, I'm home.

BEN: It's Mum!

VINCE: See you tomorrow!

(Vince runs off. Monster and Dad Monster jump under the bed. Ben picks up a book and acts innocent. Mum comes in.)

MUM: Anything happen at school?

BEN: No. Nothing special.

(Mum leaves. Ben looks under the bed. He can't see the monsters.)

BEN: Hello. Hello?
